Themes from literature review:

- 2. Mandatory, intensive counseling
- 3. The use of cohort models
- 4. Leveraging technology
- 5. Creating success teams to monitor student progress.

Purpose and Research Questions

The purpose of this qualitative multi case study is to:

- Describe what California community college counselors describe as the most important elements of guided pathways that increase student success.
- Additionally, this study will explore how counselors describe the challenges of guided pathways.
- Lastly, this study identified counselor recommendations for improving guided pathways to increase student success.

Methodology

- This qualitative case study used a multiple-case study to explore what important guided pathway features California community colleges offer students from the counselor's perspective.
- Semi-structured interviews will be held with counselors from California community colleges that have implemented guided pathways on their campuses.
- Additionally, archival records and documentation will be used to triangulate the data



Population

Target population:

12 counselors from **six** California community colleges that have implemented guided pathways in their colleges for **two or more** years.

Sample

- 12 counselors from California community colleges that implemented guided pathways at their colleges for two or more years.
- Colleges: Skyline College, Chaffey College, Modesto College, Fresno City College, West Hills Lemoore College and Cabrillo College.
- Two counselors from each institution: one male and one female, a range of ages and racial and ethnic affiliations. Counselors selected were considered:
 - General counselors
 - Full time status
 - Had been employed with the college for two or more years

Research Questions

This qualitative multi case study is to:

- Describe what California community college counselors describe as the most important elements of guided pathways that increase student success.
- Additionally, this study explored what the counselor described as the challenges of guided pathways.
- Lastly, the study identified counselor recommendations for improving guided pathways to increase student success.



Guided Pathways Definition


The participants defined guided pathways as a "reform" or "redesign" of their college that provides structured "guidance," "roadmaps" and/or "student supports" to help "streamline" the path for students to "completion."

Important Elements of Guided Pathways

Provide student supports or wraparound services
 Have strong communication with students
 Provide specialized or embedded counseling
 Offer communities
 Offer clear options
 Use a student-centered approach



FOUR PILLARS OF GUIDED PATHWAYS





Pillar 1: Clarify the Path

Four primary themes:

- 1. Provide high school outreach and assist with early decision-making
- 2. Use a career focus
- 3. Provide program maps
- 4. Create meta majors

Pillar 2: Enter the Path

Three major themes:1. Importance of counselors2. Have strong faculty engagement3. Provide accessible resources

Pillar 3: Stay on the Path

Five major themes:

- 1. Importance of counselors
- 2. Provide accessible resources
- 3. Utilize an early-alert system
- 4. Identify student milestones
- 5. Have a case-management approach

Pillar 4: Ensure Students are Learning

Four major themes:
1. Importance of counselors
2. Provide accessible resources
3. Gather student feedback
4. Use student-learning outcomes(SLOs)

Challenges of Guided Pathways

Three major themes are:1. Lack of administrative support2. Getting started with the process3. Misconceptions or outdated beliefs

Recommendations

Three themes identified:1. Have strong communication2. Involve all staff3. Show the data

Conclusions

- 1. Colleges Should Have Strong Student Support or Wraparound Services
- 2. Colleges Should Have Strong Communication with Students
- 3. Colleges Should Offer Specialized or Embedded Counseling
- 4. High School Outreach Is Critical
- 5. Colleges Should Have a Strong Career Focus
- 6. Colleges Should Have Strong Faculty Engagement
- 7. Colleges Should Have Strong Leadership

Recommended Actions

- 1. Improve Counseling
- 2. Invest in High School Outreach
- 3. Offer Strong Student Support Services
